Readings

Exodus 2:1-10

¹Now a man of the tribe of Levi married a Levite woman, ²and she became pregnant and gave birth to a son. When she saw that he was a fine child, she hid him for three months. ³But when she could hide him no longer, she got a papyrus basket for him and coated it with tar and pitch. Then she placed the child in it and put it among the reeds along the bank of the Nile. ⁴His sister stood at a distance to see what would happen to him.

⁵Then Pharaoh's daughter went down to the Nile to bathe, and her attendants were walking along the riverbank. She saw the basket among the reeds and sent her female slave to get it. ⁶She opened it and saw the baby. He was crying, and she felt sorry for him. "This is one of the Hebrew babies," she said.

⁷Then his sister asked Pharaoh's daughter, "Shall I go and get one of the Hebrew women to nurse the baby for you?"

⁸"Yes, go," she answered. So the girl went and got the baby's mother. ⁹Pharaoh's daughter said to her, "Take this baby and nurse him for me, and I will pay you." So the woman took the baby and nursed him. ¹⁰When the child grew older, she took him to Pharaoh's daughter and he became her son. She named him Moses, saying, "I drew him out of the water."

John 19:25b-27

²⁵And that is what the soldiers did. Meanwhile, standing near the cross of Jesus were his mother, and his mother's sister, Mary the wife of Clopas, and Mary Magdalene. ²⁶When Jesus saw his mother and the disciple whom he loved standing beside her, he said to his mother 'Woman, here is your son'. ²⁷Then he said to the disciple, 'Here is your mother'. And from that hour the disciple took her into his own home.

Thought for the Day - by Rev James Ashton

Today is Mothering Sunday, traditionally a day of refreshment from Lenten discipline, and an opportunity to return to the 'Mother' church. In our current practice, we mark this day by giving thanks for our own mums, but also we remember the mother of Jesus, and give thanks for her. In our other reading we also encounter Moses' mother (Jochebed), who in a wonderful tale of providence and trust, ends up caring for her son Moses in dangerous times.

At this time of our lives, we are most probably finding creative ways to celebrate Mothering Sunday. Staying in contact and giving support to our family and friends has become a vital aspect to our shared life together. We learn from Moses's family that sometimes we have to take a bold step to keep our loved ones safe. We hear

from Jesus on the cross – even in this time of awful pain, he was aware of the needs of his friends and his family.

Maybe today is day to tell your mum that you love her. A day to keep your loved ones close. Maybe it's a hard day for you, due to grief or sadness, days like this are not always radiant sunshine and daffodils. Maybe it's a day to remember or to share in cherished memories. Perhaps today is a day to get the photo album out or find new ways to share the love you have for one another.

Let us not lose heart, may we continue to reach out to those in need. We may be socially distanced, yet God is near. We may be self-isolated, yet God is always with us. We may be cancelling everything, yet God cannot be cancelled. We continue to be church, in new and creative ways. Please do continue to pray for one another.
