The ways we are doing this are:

- donating money from PCC funds to the charities. In 2019 this was £1,600.
- raising awareness of their work within the church
- -praying for the work of the charities within services & other church events and encouraging people to pray at other times
- inviting people from the charities to speak at services

Their Voice is an organisation founded on care and compassion for those who have suffered human trafficking and modern slavery. They passionately believe in the dignity and worth of every individual and provide essential practical gifts which are not provided through other sources.

They work in partnership with other agencies and NGOs, to raise awareness of the different forms of modern slavery.

Their Voice was started in 2015 by a social worker volunteering in a safe house for families who had been rescued from human trafficking and modern-day slavery. They make gift-wrapped baskets of essential toiletries, leaving them in the safe house bedrooms together with a handwritten card of welcome and encouragement. Providing basic practical necessities for birth and motherhood for women, who are heavily pregnant and recently rescued from sexual exploitation.

In addition, they now provide children's packs, consisting of a rucksack filled with age-related toys, books and stationery. These are given to every child who arrives at the safe house.

Their work has expanded and now case workers support many families in the community.





Crosslight Advice is an independent, community-focused charity working to alleviate poverty caused by problem debt and lack of financial capability.

They have a vision to restore dignity and hope to those in need by reducing debt-poverty and improving financial capability through the provision of free face-to-face advice, money education, and ongoing support.

Their heart is to meet people at their point of need and support them through to full restoration, however long that takes.

Crosslight's five core values are:

- To help anyone
- to show unconditional love
- to act without judgement
- to be open, honest, and fair
- to empower clients.

Crosslight will:

Advise: They provide a fullservice, individual, face-to-face, debt advice service.

Equip: They provide money education and resources on budgeting and practical day-to-day money management.

Encourage: They seek to go beyond advice and will support clients throughout their journey.





Spark Ministries

Reaching Albanian children, and helping others to do the same.

Spark Ministries (Shkendije), works in Albania to bring the love of God to the nation's children.We believe very much in becoming a positive part of the communities we are reaching through Spiritual and Practical work.

Spark Ministries, led by Rachel Wilson, has been working in Albania since 2000 to bring the love of God to the nation's children.

All it takes is a spark to ignite a fire in a young person's life.

It is evangelistic in its emphasis seeking to reach and teach children and to help others to do the same by partnering with local churches.

Their vision is to proclaim Jesus and his teachings to children, seeing them come to know & grow in God.

Their three main objectives: Mission/Children's Outreach, Training, Equipping

Their on-going projects:

Splash Van Outreaches use a converted van and puppets and films to take the Gospel to local villages aiding local churches to pioneer new children's work

Summer Camps – running for the last 17 years, are a very popular and effective way of reaching children's hearts. Many children cannot afford the £35 per child cost which we can help subsidise. Volunteers are always valued and training is given.





The Leprosy Mission (TLM), is an international Christian charity with 141 years of experience serving a population of 305 million people in around 30 leprosy-affected countries.

Leprosy is a mildly infectious disease associated with poverty however it is easily cured.

Leprosy starts by damaging the small nerves on the skin's surface resulting in a loss of sensation. Without the gift of pain, everyday activities are fraught with danger. Unnoticed burns and ulcers can lead to permanent disability. Due to the inability to detect grit in the eye, blindness is a common consequence of leprosy.

The combination of a disease that has a severely debilitating effect on the body and the stigma surrounding it means a unique and holistic approach is required to care for a person's needs. TLM focuses on the physical, social, spiritual and psychological needs of a leprosyaffected person. It provides housing, water, sanitation, education, training and general welfare. A myth still prevalent in the world today is that leprosy is a curse for something you have done wrong - either recently or in a past life. TLM works to break down stigma and empower people affected by leprosy to stand up for their rights. It has enabled thousands of people to have their lives transformed and to know the love of God.









Ibba Girls' Boarding School aims to provide high-quality education for girls aged approximately 10-18. Rooted in Christian values, the school is open and welcoming to people of all faiths and none.

South Sudan has been named as the worst country in the world for girls to get an education. Right now, a fifteen-year-old girl in South Sudan is more likely to die in pregnancy or childbirth than she is to complete secondary school.

As in many African countries, women and girls are responsible for most household tasks, including cooking and childcare. Collecting water alone can take up to eight hours a day in many villages. At least 1 in 2 girls in South Sudan drop out from schooling by age 10 due to these domestic pressures, and can end up married or pregnant before they have even left childhood.

It is incredibly difficult for a girl to stay in school in South Sudan. The education of a generation has been disrupted by decades of war, and girls in particular face formidable cultural and economic barriers.

We see a once-in-a-generation opportunity to make a practical difference to the education and life chances of girls in South Sudan, within the school's catchment area, former Western Equatoria State.

The school aims to educate and empower young women with the values, knowledge and skills for life, work and leadership in their local communities in the newest African nation.
