Coaching at the Edenbridge and Oxted Show 2023

Visitors to the Edenbridge and Oxted Show were entertained by six entries to the Coaching and Multiples class this year. Competitors travel large distances for the opportunity to drive around a course through local lanes and farmland. The

standard of entry is always high, this year being judged by King Charles' head coachman,

Matthew Power, whose professional eye for detail could not be disputed.

This year the competitors left the showground beside the Red Barn and travelled an



anticlockwise circular route up Ray Lane, along Lingfield Common Road and Crowhurst Lane as far as the private track through beautiful farmland belonging to Crowhurst Place and Kingswood Farm. The teams are judged at four points – before they commence the drive, when they turn left at the Crowhurst Lane junction, at the farm belonging to John and Pat Young, and then finally when they arrive back at the ring. The cleanliness and accuracy of the turnout as well as the way the horses are driven are all included in the final decision-making process.

The teams were all given a break in the farmyard, during which time horses and humans are all offered welcome and delicious refreshments, kindly donated by John and Pat Young.

This year the winners of the Coaching, Four in Hand class were the team of black Friesian horses driven by Sonny Hillier. Sonny, from the east of Kent, uses his horses for weddings and funerals and is a regular, successful contestant across the showing circuit. His vehicle is a road coach that was restored by a small family coachbuilding company called Fairbourne Carriages near Maidstone.

A lot of people will know that there were two 'volunteers' from Tandridge who, despite never having ploughed before, entered the respective classes for their tractors. Neil Mesher was on his 1967 Massey 135 and David Ledesma (right) on his 1950s 'Little Grey Fergie'. David won first prize for the best Novice on the day in Tandridge's International Ploughing Match held on Saturday 9th September (read more on page 21) I bought a second-hand drier which can dry 15-ton batches at a time. Each batch takes about 3 hours to dry and then cool. This has been really useful when we have had overnight showers and heavy mists or dews because it has allowed us to start combining earlier than if we were having to wait for the sun to dry the crops out before we can start cutting. Naturally there is a cost to all this, but I estimate we have gained 3 or 4 days' worth of cutting, by processing 30—40 tons each day, which we would otherwise not have had or would still be waiting for.

Thirdly was a hopper in which to put the wet grain before it can be fed into the drier. Now imagine a cross between a Meccano set, with instructions from Ikea, 3 pallets of steel parts and 3,000 nuts and 3.000 bolts. That is what turned up. What it turned into was a hopper which is 4m x 4m x 3.5m high, which can hold 25 -30 tons of wheat, about the same as an articulated lorry load. It took four of us, me, Zoe, Piers (our new man) and my 83-year-old dad, about nine days, with the odd interruption, to complete. We then bolted it to a couple of lengths of carcase timber, roof beams, and dragged it into position. Never again.

On a much happier note, the best crops we have grown this year are the fields of clover and the plots of winter bird feed mixes, which are dotted about the farm. The clover looked a bit shabby at one point, so we topped them and they benefitted from some unseasonal rain and grew back better than ever and it has provided perfect habitats for insects, bees and birds. The winter bird feed mixes cover about 25 acres in different plots around the estate; again the summer rain allowed them to grow in ideal conditions. They comprise a mixture of 'spring' cereals: vetch, quinoa, mustard, radish and, to my surprise, sunflowers. One should always read the label. Anyone who has walked on the footpath from Southlands wood to Gibbs Brook Lane will have seen them growing.

We held another British Eventing horse trial at Blindley Heath in August. The rain stopped long enough for the ground to dry out, no vehicles got stuck, and the 'going' was about perfect for the horses, and still soft enough for those riders who parted company with their horses. As an event it is growing and hopefully we can extend the scope and complexity of the course, allow for more classes and attract more riders which in turn will attract more spectators.

Farming News—September 2023

It is September again, another harvest done and dusted. 'Dusted' probably isn't quite appropriate because of the grotty weather. Most of what looked like dust was in fact fungal spores from the diseases which proliferated in the wet conditions. If you walked past any fields of wheat before they were cut and wondered why they were going black instead of golden yellow, that is why. It is all harmless, mildew, sooty mould and smut, but everything, including us, gets coated. Tractor windows need constant cleaning, machines are filthy and my side of the bed looks like the Turin Shroud.



Yields are down compared to recent years, grain prices are down from the dizzy heights of last year and our costs have gone up. Enough said really. Sometimes running a farm is like a marriage.

For richer or for poorer, in sickness and in health, etc and there are times when the grass, or crops, look greener over the fence. This year the problems are fairly universal; you would have to go a long way, and jump a lot of hedges, and take a few pinches of salt, to find a farmer who has had a decent harvest.

I made two, no three purchases, in the spring that I hoped would improve our prospects at harvest. First was a weighbridge. Simple and very effective, horribly accurate, and as John Nicholas kindly pointed out, 'Removes any last-minute delusions'. We have always made educated guesses about what we have been bringing back to the farm based on the odd trip to the weighbridge at Fairalls Taylors Hill yard; now we know exactly what each field has yielded, instantly. Second was a grain drier. We have always had the capacity to get grain to a point where it is safe to store long term, usually less than 16% moisture if it has been cut at 17-17.5%, but we have never had the ability to cut at say 18.5% and dry it down to 14 or 15% in one go. 15% moisture is an industry standard for grain sold off farm. Anything higher incurs penalties which are deducted from the agreed sale price.

It does mean, however, that it is somewhat easier for the children and staff alike to gently ease back into the swing of things after the summer break. The sunshine always puts a smile on people's faces.

Here at St Peter's School we all have lots of happy, smiley faces and the children have definitely come back with a spring in their step. We have welcomed our new Busy Bee Reception

class to St Peter's and we would like to extend a very warm welcome to them and the whole

school community. We hope that you all have many very happy years with us.

Over the summer the library area was being refurbished with the fantastic support of the Friends of St Peter's (PTA); with a special mention going to Keren Gatty-Saunt, Claire Devey and Jennie Liddiard. 
The outdoor services provided an opportunity to enjoy our beautiful surroundings. The weather was mostly fine and sometimes even too hot, but we

Remembrance Service at St Peter's Church 12th November.

Two names on the Tandridge War Memorial.

Burchett Thomas Edwin, G/1851 Sergeant. 7th Battalion the Queens (Royal West Surrey) Regiment. Killed in action on the 3rd August, 1918 aged 24. He was born in East Grinstead; enlisted at Redhill and lived at Blindley Heath. The son of John and Mary Ann Burchett of "Sunny Side", Orpington, Kent. On 3rd August 1918, the 7th Queens were holding the line in front of Albert on the Somme. Buried at Querrieu British Cemetery grave D14.

<u>Cooper</u>, George

Canadian Infantry. The son of George (a general labourer) and Matilda Cooper of Yew Tree Cottage, Tandridge, aged 8 in 1901.
